1st Sunday of Advent

Jeremiah 33:14-16 1 Thessalonians 3:12 - 4:2 Luke 21:25-28, 34-36 *To you, O Lord, I lift my soul.*

May the love of the Father, the peace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you always. We have already entered the time of preparation for the birth of Our Lord Jesus Christ, a time that we know as Advent, which means coming. Specifically, we talk about the coming of Jesus to the world and at the same time we also reflect on His second coming.

The word of God is clear regarding what will happen in the world. First, the prophets prophesied specifically about the coming of a Savior, a Messiah, the Lord who would come to rescue the world from sin. At the right time Jesus began to preach His message of salvation, inviting 12 disciples whom He personally called to participate in His plan of salvation. The apostles did not understand many of the teachings at the time, but after they received the Holy Spirit they clearly understood what their mission was.

We have also received this message of salvation through the teachings of the church, but like the apostles, sometimes we do not understand what is expected of us. In the gospels Jesus tells us about a specific day, referring to His second coming, where there will be signs that must be taken as the signs that the day of the Lord is already here. He invites us to be prepared remaining faithful to His teachings and asks us to pray to stay strong in faith. The Lord is near! Let us spend this Advent preparing our hearts to receive Him.



Isaiah 11: 1-10


Luke 10: 21-24

Tuesday of the 4th Week of Advent


Micah 5: 1-4a Hebrews 10: 5-10 Luke 1: 39-45 Lord, make us turn to you; let us see your face and we shall be saved.
