

# Father Frank's Fire

Today we celebrate the Presentation of the Lord. Mary and Joseph bring Jesus to the temple and present him to God in the same way parents bring their children to the Church for baptism. The Presentation indicates that Mary and Joseph were faithful Jewish people and followed Mosaic Law (The Law of Moses). Luke tells us that they offered a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons. What is interesting is that the Mosaic Law required a year-old lamb to be offered. The family who could not afford a lamb offered a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons. This is a clear indication that the Holy Family was not wealthy.

Simeon and Anna were present in the temple. They were faithful and both of them prayed for the salvation of Israel. Many people pray for our world. Members of religious orders spend hours a day praying for the salvation of the world. When was the last time you prayed for the conversion of the world? We seem to pray for our intentions or the intentions of someone we know. The entire world needs prayer, and Simeon and Anna provide a model for us to follow.

Simeon was so grateful for beholding the child Jesus that he offers this beautiful prayer:

Now Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the sight of all the peoples: a light for revelation to the Gentiles and glory for your people Israel.

Simeon was promised that he would not see death until he saw the Promised One. The Word of God was fulfilled in Jesus. This same prayer is prayed during Night Prayer of the Liturgy of the Hours. The Liturgy of the Hours is the prayer that priests, deacons, religious and many lay people pray daily. This Canticle is an acknowledgement that we have experienced the Savior in Jesus.

The encounters with Simeon and Anna are a way for Luke to present Jesus to both the Jewish people and the Gentiles. Jesus, Mary and Joseph return to Nazareth. The implication of the Presentation is that Jesus was raised as a faithful Jew and became well-versed in their laws and religious traditions.

Joseph and Mary raised Jesus in the practice of their faith. They taught Jesus the traditions, laws and practices. It is assumed that they also taught Jesus by example. Today families want to pass the teaching of the faith to the parish school and religious education programs. Yet it is in the home where children learn about the faith. It is by the example of our parents that we learn how to practice our faith. This is not the sole responsibility of teachers and catechists. If what is taught in the classroom is not practiced at home – it is lost or forgotten.

During the baptismal ritual parents are asked this simple question:

In asking for Baptism for your child, you are undertaking the responsibility of raising him/her in the faith, so that, keeping God's commandments, he/she may love the Lord and his/her neighbor as Christ taught us. Do you understand this responsibility?

This may be a simple question, but one accepts a tremendous responsibility – a responsibility that does not transfer to others. Our actions or inactions speak louder than words. *Have you passed on our beautiful Catholic faith by both your words and your actions*?



Many years ago, according to the Jewish law, if the firstborn child was a boy, the infant would be consecrated to God to show their love and respect for Him. When parents did this, they would commit themselves to



raise the child in the faith and dedicate their lives to God. Mary and Joseph trusted God, but they may not have known exactly what to do. Yet they continued to follow the tradition of their faith and followed God's Law by presenting Jesus in the Temple.

Mary held many things in her heart and fear was one of them. She knew that Jesus was destined to do great things, and that he also would suffer. But how and when would he suffer? Despite these fears, Mary continued to say "yes" to God. Mary wants all of us to know and love her son Jesus. She may not have understood her exact role in God's plan, but she raised Jesus in the best way she knew how. Mary following sacred traditions was one step of many she took.

I think that while our parents may not always have all the right answers either, they did choose to baptize us and bring us to church, and they want us to learn about Jesus. This is their way of following what they know to be true and respectful to God. Many people turn away from God because life isn't working out the way that they think it should. We must try our best to focus on God during the most difficult times in our lives. He is always there and He is listening; we just need to allow Him to work within us. Let us trust OUR earthly parents and guardians in leading us to the right path. Knowing God and behaving like Jesus is something we should strive to do daily.



Before the First Reading the children are called forward, blessed and sent to the Chapel. They listen to the Word of the Lord proclaimed by their peers. Then the YPLW Facilitator leads a reflection/discussion on the readings and how they apply to the lives of the children. Children do not need to register to participate in YPLW. Just bring them to Mass and send them out to the chapel with the other children & the YPLW leader.





# El Espiritu del Padre Frank

Hoy celebramos la Presentación del Señor. María y José llevan a Jesús al templo y lo presentan a Dios de la misma manera que los padres llevan a sus hijos a la Iglesia para el bautismo. La Presentación indica que María y José eran judíos fieles y seguían la Ley Mosaica (la Ley de Moisés). Lucas nos dice que ofrecieron un par de tórtolas o dos pichones. Lo interesante es que la Ley Mosaica exigía que se ofreciera un cordero de un año. La familia, que no podía permitirse un cordero, ofreció un par de tórtolas o dos pichones. Esto es una clara indicación de que la Sagrada Familia no era rica.

Simeón y Ana estaban presentes en el templo. Eran fieles y ambos oraron por la salvación de Israel. Mucha gente ora por nuestro mundo. Los miembros de las órdenes religiosas pasan horas al día orando por la salvación del mundo. ¿Cuándo fue la última vez que oraste por la conversión del mundo? Parece que oramos por nuestras intenciones o por las intenciones de alguien que conocemos. El mundo entero necesita oración, y Simeón y Ana nos ofrecen un modelo a seguir.

Simeón estaba tan agradecido al contemplar al niño Jesús que ofreció esta hermosa oración:

Ahora pues, Señor, puedes dejar ir a tu siervo en paz, conforme a tu palabra, porque han visto mis ojos tu salvación, la que has preparado a la vista de todos los pueblos; luz para revelación a las naciones, y gloria para tu pueblo Israel.

A Simeón se le prometió que vería la muerte hasta que viera al Prometido. La Palabra de Dios se cumplió en Jesús. Esta misma oración se reza durante la Oración de la Noche de la Liturgia de las Horas. La Liturgia de las Horas es la oración que los sacerdotes, diáconos, religiosos y muchos laicos rezan diariamente. Este Cántico es un reconocimiento de que hemos experimentado al Salvador en Jesús.

Los encuentros con Simeón y Ana son una manera para Lucas de presentar a Jesús tanto al pueblo judío como a los gentiles. Jesús, María y José regresan a Nazaret. La presentación implica que Jesús fue criado como un judío fiel y llegó a conocer bien sus leyes y tradiciones religiosas.

José y María criaron a Jesús en la práctica de su fe. Le enseñaron las tradiciones, leyes y prácticas. Se supone que también le enseñaron con el ejemplo. Hoy en día, las familias quieren transmitir la enseñanza de la fe a la escuela parroquial y a los programas de educación religiosa. Sin embargo, es en el hogar donde los niños aprenden sobre la fe. Es mediante el ejemplo de nuestros padres que aprendemos a practicar nuestra fe. Esto no es responsabilidad exclusiva de los maestros y catequistas. Si lo que se enseña en el aula no se practica en casa, se pierde o se olvida.

Durante el ritual bautismal se les hace a los padres esta sencilla pregunta:

Al pedir el Bautismo para tu hijo, asumes la responsabilidad de educarlo en la fe, para que, guardando los mandamientos de Dios, ame al Señor y al prójimo como Cristo nos enseñó. ¿Entiendes esta responsabilidad?

Puede que sea una pregunta sencilla, pero uno acepta una enorme responsabilidad, una responsabilidad que no se transfiere a los demás. Nuestras acciones o inacciones hablan más que las palabras. ¿Ha transmitido usted nuestra hermosa fe católica con sus palabras y sus acciones?


